















#### God makes a world

Then came an exciting moment! God filled the sea with slippery, shiny fish and the air with birds that chatter and sing. God made animals that leap and clamber and crawl on the land.


God was pleased with everything he had made. It was very good.

'Now I will make human beings,' said God. 'They will look after the world I have made and all the animals in it. They will eat the juicy fruit and the ripe grain of the fields.'



'Where are you?'




'Leave the boat, you and your family and all the animals. Fill the land with the birds and animals. Have children and fill the earth again.'

Jacob went to his father with the soup. Isaac was tricked and thought it was Esau! So he gave him his special blessing.



One night Joseph had a strange dream. He told his brothers all about it the next day. But they didn't like what they heard!







They killed a goat and dipped Joseph's torn coat in the blood. They went to their father, Jacob, and told him the bad news. They didn't tell him the truth.


'A wild animal has killed Joseph!' wailed Jacob. 'My son is dead!'

Miriam stepped forward bravely.


'Shall I find someone to feed him?'

went to the king of Egypt.



Moses went down to the River Nile and put his stick in the water. The water turned to blood. All the fish died. But the king refused to listen to Moses.




Next came a terrible disease that killed the animals in the fields. Horses, donkeys, cows, sheep and goats lay dead on the ground.




God had a plan. He told Moses to lift his stick and hold it over the waters of the sea. The water divided and the Israelites were able to walk across on the dry land!

On the seventh day, the priests would march around the city six times. On the seventh time, the priests would sound a long, loud note on their rams' horns, and the people would give a great shout.


So that is exactly what Joshua and the people did. They marched around the city each day until, on the seventh day and on the seventh march, the people gave a great shout.


The walls of the city collapsed! Joshua and his people captured the God's words and was careful to obey God's laws.



'I need someone to play the harp to me!' said King Saul.


One of the king's servants told Saul about David. 'David is a brave and handsome man, a good soldier and he plays the harp well.'

David tried on the king's armour, but it was far too big. He decided to meet the giant without it. David went to the brook with his sling, picked up five smooth stones and put them in his bag.


When Goliath saw David, he laughed a cruel laugh.


'You have a sword and a spear,' said David, 'but I have God on my side!'



that you are the true God of Israel! Show these people that you are God and that you are bringing them back to vourself!'


God answered Elijah's prayer. He sent down fire from heaven. It burnt up the bull, the wood, and the stones and dried up all the water in the trench!


The people watching were amazed and shouted, 'The Lord is God!'

Naaman was angry. He thought Elisha would at least come out and pray for him.


'Just try it and see,' said Naaman's servants. 'If he had asked you to do something difficult, you would have done it!'




Naaman returned to Elisha and

God answered Jonah's prayer. A


huge fish opened his mouth and took Jonah into his belly. There Jonah prayed to God and sang praises to him.


After three days, the fish spat Jonah out on to a beach.


Matthew 9:9-13

'But if you don't listen to my



'Don't worry,' said Jesus kindly, 'she is not dead. She is just sleeping.'


He went into the house with Peter, John and James and spoke to the girl.


'Get up, my child,' he said gently. At once, life returned to her body and she sat up! It was a miracle.





"Look after him," he told the innkeeper. "If he costs you any more than this, I will pay you when I return."





'I want to see!' he sighed.


'Then see!' said Jesus. 'You believe I can help you. Your faith has made you well!'

'You are most welcome to my house,' said Zacchaeus.



A week later, Thomas and all the disciples were gathered together and had locked all the doors.





Ierusalem from other countries could understand what they were saying.


Peter told the crowds all about Jesus. He told them about how Jesus had done amazing things, healed people and shown God's power. He had been put to death on a cross but he had come alive again!


